By the Numbers

56,690 people served in 2016, the third largest number ever, including 33,593 served in person (vs. virtually), the second-largest number ever

Our fifth-largest bequest, **\$72,535**, came in2017 from former board member and volunteer Ray Toler, of which \$50,000 went to our endowment and \$22,535 to facility repairs

Major Accomplishments in 2017

By year's end, almost all of the interior renovation on the historic 1871 Shiloh Meeting Hall was complete and work on property improvements—a parking lot, lighting, signs, and grounds



work—was about to begin. The commitment to project completion was put over the top by a \$255,673 grant from the Walton Family Foundation. A celebratory opening of the Hall will no doubt be a highlight of 2018.



The fourth section of the museum's exhibit hall to be completed covers the 1950s to the future. Included are earlier and later versions of poultry houses interiors, poultry-processing plants, and retail

stores and a look at transportation, tourism, UA research, and how Beaver Lake affected the last half of the 20th century. Slideshows provide selections of late 20th-century photos from the Arkansas Ozarks, and there's even a place to imagine the Ozarks in the future. Like our other new exhibits, all text is in both English and Spanish.

The museum grounds were enhanced again this year by the amazing work of Washington County Master Gardener volunteers who assist groundskeeper Marty Powers and



keep our museum campus in tiptop shape. At the very end of the year we were able to provide a beautiful rock sign for the museum entrance, after our corner sign was demolished in a car accident.



Three movie "shorts" styled after the "Our Gang" comedies were filmed in Fayetteville, Springdale, and Bentonville in 1937, using local children as cast members. The Kidnappers Foil films were discovered in 2016 by Todd Terpening, who donated them to the Library of Congress where he volunteers. Our library staff extensively researched the films, tracked down many of the child actors or their families, and arranged for an eighty-years-later premiere of the movies, along with reminiscences by several of the child actors (now in their eighties and nineties) and a talk by Terpening. Thereafter museum staff created DVDs of the films and the premiere and provided them to all the known actors and/or their families.



The museum partnered with 132 organizations and individuals to connect, collaborate, and share, including: "Pastimes of Black Settlers," a program with the Washington County Historical Society; "Changing the Narrative," a dialog between NWA law enforcement and the community, sponsored by the NWA chapter of the NAACP and NWA Urban League Young Professionals; "DREAMers: Untold Stories of the American Dream," in collaboration with the DREAMers of NWACC; and programs sponsored by the Downtown Springdale Alliance, such as barn parties, hayrides, and visits with Santa.
